SHARING OUR IMAGES OF MARY ~ WHO IS MARY FOR YOU?

To start us off, this is what Fr. Pernet had to say about Mary's Assumption:

"The Blessed Virgin, our mother, is in heaven; she is there in **glory**, in **joy** and **happiness**. **She is in glory**. Who is she who rises "as beautiful as the moon", "as chosen, as high as the sun"? "**Beautiful as the moon**", that is to say, it reflects God as much as a creature can; for is it not perfectly pure in all its being, as well as being set on fire with the purest love for God? Is it not his glory?"

"Raised like the sun", that is to say, she is like her motherhood ... it borders on divinity; she is not God as in a place, but she comes close to it by the beauty and holiness which are in her a mysterious radiance of the perfections of God himself. **She is happy** with a happiness so great, so complete, that no heart created after that of our Lord enjoys so much happiness: "He who is mighty has done great things in me," and these great things are to have preserved it, to have sanctified it and prepared it for this enjoyment of happiness in God.»

General Chapter 2017

1. "Today, in celebrating the Assumption let us think of the triple love which Fr. Pernet taught us: Love of Our Lord Jesus Christ, of the Blessed Virgin and of the Church (the people of God). In the moment of history which is ours we need these three loves to strengthen and encourage us, to sustain us in Hope. The world in which we live is full of suffering, violence and threats... in an active, committed manner we wish to be God's accomplices in the birth of a new world where Justice and Peace will reign."

ALL: Let us again ask Mary for the grace to be faithful to our Mission, to keep us always close to the poor and the workers, that she may win for us the grace to listen to the cries of God, the cries of our contemporaries, of doing "all that He tells us".

3. "Woman of her people, she was formed by their life, moulded by their collective experience, fashioned by their longings. With her people, she watched in faith for the coming of the Messiah. She said yes without fully understanding how it could be realized. She placed her confidence in God's promise, but that promise, was not simply foretelling the future: it required a commitment."

ORIGIN OF THE PACT

On March 26th, 1903 the Congregation of the Little Sisters of the Assumption was 25 years old. The General Superior, Mother Mary of the Blessed Sacrament, was called to court to account for the sisters' works and services among the poor of Paris. The Little Sisters were in defiance with the law which had forbidden such services.

When she was questioned by the prosecutor about the works of the Congregation, she said: "I have never believed that in France there was a law forbidding the liberty of charity. Therefore, I paid no attention to that law." There was silence in the courtroom following her statement.

Whereas numerous religious congregations had been persecuted or exiled from France for non-conformance to the law, Mother Mary of the Blessed Sacrament was fined one hundred francs and fifty francs for her companions.

The working poor who accompanied her to the courthouse carried her home on their shoulders to a celebration of friends, sisters and working poor families.

In remembrance of this event, Little Sisters of the Assumption all over the world gather on the Feast of Our Lady of the Assumption, August 15th, to give thanks for the gift of our mission and to ask Mary's guidance for our mission today.



This spirituality of Encounter and Visitation nourishes our relations and marks the quality of these experiences through prayer, silence, interiority, listening, celebration, compassion, forgiveness, respect, beauty, openness, simplicity and reciprocity. The path of Incarnation of Jesus Christ, Servant and Savior, dwells in us and guides our choices, our "being with" others.
